Human Trafficking Routes into the U.S. from the Southern Border



This map depicts the main routes and patterns of human trafficking using the Southern border. It was created using federal cases of foreign national sex and labor trafficking and information from the FBI on three of the main transnational criminal organizations (TCOs) who use human trafficking as part of their business model.

CONSEQUENCES of an UNSECURE BORDER:

From 2019 to 2024, U.S. government agencies had over **585,000** child encounters, most of them **Unaccompanied Alien Children (UACs)**, highlighting the significant, ongoing flow of these vulnerable children.

Between **75–80%** of UACs are victims of human trafficking, as they travel into the U.S. with smugglers who then sell them into forced labor or prostitution.

The **majority** of unaccompanied alien children **crossing** into the U.S. were between **13** and **17** years of age.
